Sinking Fund Update

When school starts August 28, 2017, parents will notice an entirely new student drop-off and pick-up procedure at Woodworth Elementary School. Thanks to the passage of the sinking fund, a new student drop-off and pick-up area will be located in front of Woodworth off of Pennsylvania Street. This drop-off area is designed for parents who choose to drive their children to and from school. Students whose parents drop-off/pick-up will enter the school through the front door of Woodworth.

A separate bus drop-off and pick-up area will be created behind the school using the open lot on Race Street. Students who ride a bus to Woodworth will enter into the building through the gym.

By creating the two drop-off/pick-up areas, bus and parent traffic should stay separated which will limit traffic congestion at Woodworth in the morning and afternoon. It should also help alleviate traffic backups at the four-way stop at the corner of Pennsylvania and Race streets. The new design of the drop-off and pick-up areas will also create more parking spaces at Woodworth.

Construction of the project is planned to begin on Monday, June 12, 2017. Because of this, we ask for your patience and understanding that Woodworth will not be available this summer for activities.

Meet Gail Deschaine and Danielle Ziehmer



Gail Deschaine, also known affectionately as "Ms. Val," says "High school is about opening doors to a range of possibilities for your child after graduation. I want your child to have choices about his or

her future." Gail and Danielle help students plan for their futures by working on their current circumstances through guidance in scheduling, post-secondary educational paths, and individual advising/counseling. Whenever possible, they try to tailor each student's education to individual needs, but they also understand that students' academic achievements are dependent on their emotional well-being. Therefore, our counselors work with the whole child. Your child can see one of our counselors by signing up in Student Services. Students can also be referred to the counseling office by their parent/ guardian, teachers or administrator.



Danielle Ziehmer starts each school year at Woodworth Elementary by reminding the children that her biggest goal is for them to feel happy and safe at school. Elementary counseling helps

support the healthy growth and development of the whole child (social, emotional, and academic). The process of growth is encouraged through classroom lessons, small group counseling, individual interventions and problem solving, as well as collaboration with parents and staff. There is a calendar with smiley faces to show the days she is in the building, as well as a "Request to see Mrs. Ziehmer, School Counselor" box outside of her office. Children can ask their teacher for an appointment request sheet as needed, and place it in that box. Children may also be referred to Mrs. Ziehmer by a parent/guardian, teacher, or administrator.

Early Childhood Programs

You're ready to send your child to school! This is an exciting time but can also cause families a bit of anxiety. Let us help! We have a variety of programs and serve our families proudly with free and tuition-based programs which include transportation. We offer wrap around care so if your family needs before or after school care, we can help.

Who can attend our early childhood programs? All children above two and half years of age can participate in our programs, but not everyone is eligible for the same program. Qualifying factors depend on the age of your child, family income and individual family experiences. Children who are age two and a half to age three on or before September 1 of the calendar year often only qualify for our tuition-based program although there are a limited number of Federal Head Start half-day program slots that may be available to children who are three but only if all qualifying four year old children are being served. Children who are four on or before September 1 of the calendar year may qualify for the Great Start Readiness Program, Head Start or our tuition preschool program.

How do I enroll a child in a program? We have multiple program options, but we use one enrollment form to determine eligibility and best fit for each family. You can fill out an application at inghampreschool.org.

What happens next? We begin the enrollment process after March 1 each year for students to enter the program the following September. The enrollment process begins with an interview and exchange of information.

Prime Time Classes Support Student Success By Kyla Kralapp, Leslie Middle School Student

From 8:00-8:35 daily, all of our middle school students are enrolled in a Prime Time Class. Students are enrolled in either an intervention class (reading or math) or an enrichment class. Enrichment classes consist of art, gym, current events, projects class and GATE (Gifted and Talented Education).

Prime Time gym gives students a chance to be active and get some exercise. One student in gym said he liked it for this very reason.

Art Prime Time gives kids a chance to be creative. Creativity is vital to students' learning success. Students paint, use clay, and draw. One student, Logan, said "I get to take my ideas and put them on paper."

Mr. Doane's Current Events class gives kids a fun way to learn social studies. They look at maps, do geography games on the computer, and color to learn. This helps students with core social studies learning, but also to be aware of the events going on around them.

Our Projects class allows students the opportunity to investigate ideas and projects that they are interested in, but that don't always fall into our traditional classes. They learn about all kinds of interesting topics.

Finally, our GATE class gives students free range on learning

about a number of trades and talents. They are currently working on businesses for the Lansing Youth Startup Challenge. One student I talked to has competed in the business expo, put together the yearbook, run lights for drama club, and researched cancer.

Students' moods are positive about their Prime Time classes. They say they enjoy them and the freedom and extra learning it gives them. Even though it's early in the morning, they seem to have a lot of energy. For these reasons and more, Prime Time classes are leading to student success at Leslie Middle School.

- Food served at summer meal sites follows USDA nutrition guidelines and is paid for by the USDA.
- Summer meal sites are safe places for kids and teens to go, such as schools, churches, and community centers.
- Parents don't need to apply to the program to get a FREE summer meal for their kids. They can simply bring their child to a summer meals site in their community, and their kids can enjoy it without the hassle of having to fill out an application.

Lunch will be available Tuesday thru Thursday. Lunch is from 11:15a.m.-12:15p.m. Dates of service are June 13 – July 27.

Pesticide/Herbicide Use Notification

Leslie Public Schools has adopted an Integrated Pest Management (IPM) program. Inherent with this are the District's efforts to reduce pesticide use as much as possible. While it may occasionally be necessary to apply a pesticide, these will only be used as a last resort. This program does not rely on routine pesticide applications to resolve problems. We use various techniques such as habitat alteration, sanitation, mechanical means, exclusion, etc. to prevent pests from becoming a problem.

Parents will receive advanced notice of the application at their child's school of any pesticide other than a bait or gel formulation. This advance notice of the application will be given 48 hours before the application. The law requires us to provide notification by using two methods. The second method we are going to use is posting a notice in a common area located by the main office of the school. Parents are also entitled to receive this notice by first-class United States mail postmarked at least three days before the application. If you would like to be notified by mail, please contact the Facility Department at 517-589-8413. Leave your name, mailing address and which school your child attends.

In an emergency (for example, bees nest), pesticides may be applied without prior notice, but parents will be provided notice following any such application.

You may review our IPM program or pesticide application records by calling the Facility Director at 517-589-8413 or by emailing troy.james@ lesliek12.net. This number or email may also be used when school is not in regular session.
