Sinking Fund Update

When the Leslie School Board asked voters to approve a Sinking Fund, the first project to tackle was the reconfiguration of the student drop-off and pick-up areas at Woodworth Elementary. As promised, this project was completed in the summer of 2017. The project separated parent and bus traffic and increased the much-needed parking area.

The School Board has approved several projects for the summer of 2018. These projects include new roofing over sections of Woodworth and Leslie Middle School and some parking lot repair and resurfacing in several sections of the district's parking lots. The roof sections that are scheduled to be replaced are more than 30 years old.

For the summer of 2019, the Board established a plan to make much-needed repairs to some of the district's athletic facilities. The Board is planning to relocate the soccer field to the north side of Leslie High School. The second project scheduled for the summer of 2019 is to finish the bleachers at the football field. Their goal is to have both of these projects completed for the fall of 2019.

Readers Theater



Students spend time reading and rereading their lines together to form the story, which in turn, develops their fluency skills.

opportunity that I had to represent Leslie on the long jump runway at the Division III Track & Field State Finals three years in a row, and the chance to stand on the podium ranked as fourth in the State of Michigan as a junior. It was certainly an experience of a lifetime. I would have never been able to realize that achievement if it weren't for my coach, James Harrison.

Achievements during school?

While at Leslie, I was actively involved in both athletics and extracurricular organizations. I was a captain and four-time Varsity Letter winner in cross country and track & field; two-time captain and three-time Varsity Letter winner in bowling; a student council officer (varsity letter); member of the National Honor Society; recipient of the John Philip Sousa Award; solo & ensemble duet and soloist; senior class homecoming queen; and an honor roll student.

As a "great grad," what advice would you give current students?

My advice to current students is to begin cultivating "soft skills" as early as possible. These are simple skills such as being an effective communicator, demonstrating emotional intelligence (selfawareness of your emotions and those of others), and understanding business etiquette.



Achievements since/after graduating

Upon graduating from LHS, I earned a four-year, full-tuition scholarship to Olivet College after being named the first winner of the Global Citizens Honors Program scholarship competition. Throughout my college career, I was honored to have been named to the Dean and President's Lists each semester for outstanding academic achievements. During my senior

year, I had the opportunity to enter a five-minute entrepreneurial pitch competition called The Launching, hosted by the Lansing Economic Area Partnership (LEAP), and won the first-place prize of \$1,000 for an artisan coffee shop concept.

In addition, I was humbled to have been named the 2016 Charles M. Trubac "Most Outstanding Insurance Student" – the highest award that an Insurance & Risk Management senior can receive from the Insurance & Risk

Management program at Olivet College. I am also incredibly proud to have been a recipient of the Donald A. Morris award.

Following graduation from Olivet College, I joined Frankenmuth Insurance as a marketing specialist in June 2016 and have since earned my CPIA (Certified Professional Insurance Agent) designation, in addition to the University

Associate Certified Risk Manager (UACRM) designation I had earned while at Olivet. Recently, I also led an effort to charter the Frankenmuth Insurance Young Professionals Affinity Network as a way to connect and foster strong relationships among up-and-coming leaders across my company. I'm pleased to share that I accepted a nomination from my peers for the position of Chairperson for this

organization, and I look forward to an exciting year ahead!

What is your current employment information?

While a senior at Olivet College, I accepted a job offer during my fall semester to join Frankenmuth Insurance as a marketing specialist after graduation. This June will mark two years that I have been a part of the Marketing Department, and I enjoy how rewarding and challenging my work is. As lead for company communications and content, such as website blogs and social media, you never see the same thing twice. This is just one of several aspects that I "specialize" in on my team.

When I was a senior at Leslie High School, I would have never dreamed that I would be studying insurance and risk management in college (I had thought I was going to be a journalist!), then starting my career working for an insurance company. Favorite memory or memories from LPS



any team to improve and make


themselves better players to prepare

TAKING PRIDE IN BUS MAINTENANCE

Leslie Public Schools takes pride in the safety of the students who ride our busses. For this reason, our busses are all routinely cared for and maintained by our fulltime mechanic Mike Bennett.

The State of Michigan inspects our busses once every year to ensure they are safe for transporting students. When the state comes in to inspect the busses, they usually give us one day or less notice for their three-day inspection. The inspection consists of one state bus mechanic working with the school mechanic for the three-day period. The state mechanic has the option to inspect hundreds of parts on each bus. After the inspection, each bus is tagged in one of three ways. A green tag means all the parts on the bus meet the safety criteria, so the district can use the bus until the next year's inspection. A yellow tag means a part was discovered needing some work, but the bus can still be driven safely. The part, however, must be fixed and inspected again within the next few weeks. A red tag means some part on

the bus was found that needs immediate repair, so the bus must be removed from use until repaired and re-inspected.

Our Leslie bus drivers also have a big hand in making sure the busses are safe for all the students in the district. Before drivers can take their busses out of the lot, they must do a 75-point pre-trip inspection. Some points of the bus inspection include the engine area, the underside of the bus, the sides, the back, wheels, tires, fluids, all lights, driver area, gauges, breaks and seats. The drivers must also document all of their pre-trip inspections and save them for the year. When a driver discovers something that does not seem right or they find a broken part on the bus, they fill out a repair form and give it to the mechanic. Usually, a bus is inspected twice a day, as most drivers have a minimum of two routes.

Not only do the drivers inspect the busses, but so does Mr. Bennett who takes a lot of pride in the care and maintenance of the bus fleet. In between the repair of the busses and during non-driving times, Mr. Bennett

inspects the busses for normal wear and tear and checks the brakes and all other areas not seen by drivers.

Mr. Bennett has worked for Leslie Public Schools since 2001, and has been the mechanic since 2009. Over the years, Mr. Bennett has managed to maintain an aging bus fleet. He has also received many perfect state inspections. In 2017, Mr. Bennett was one of only two school mechanics in the area to receive a perfect score on the state bus inspection. With the average age and mileage of busses in school fleets rising, Leslie Public Schools has some of the safest busses for students to be riding to and from school.
