
SOCCER FIELD

As you travel on North Main Street, just outside Leslie City Limits, you will notice some heavy equipment on the east side of the road. This will soon be the new location of Leslie Public Schools' varsity soccer field. Work is scheduled to begin in mid-April and continue through the first couple weeks of July. The field was designed by Kingscott and will be constructed by Bailey Excavating.

Soccer is one of the fastest growing sports in the United States and a sport enjoyed by youth of all ages in the Leslie area. Construction of the new soccer field was a priority of the Leslie Board of Education because of the increased popularity of soccer and the condition of the present varsity field across from Woodworth.

Construction of the new soccer field was made possible by the passage of the sinking fund. Other projects paid for from the sinking fund are the drop-off and pick-up areas at Woodworth, roofs at the Middle School and Woodworth, repaving and cementing of the bus garage parking area, the new boiler at the High School (in progress), and new water pipes at the Middle School.

School-wide Instructional Goal

Along with our yearly school improvement goals, Woodworth Elementary School has an instructional goal to achieve throughout the 2018-19 school year. The goal, developed by our teaching and administration staff, is to increase each grade level's percentage of low risk students by 10%, as determined by benchmark testing. Students are considered "low risk" when they are reading at or above grade level. After the winter assessments, the data showed an increase at all grade levels, some as high as 33%! Due to teacher investment in the goal-making process and specific, targeted interventions, our students and staff are able to improve achievement rates at a higher level.


Leslie Public School's Make a Difference Dessert took place on Tuesday, March 19 in the Leslie High School commons for the fourth year in a row.



Leslie Middle School sponsored interscholastic athletic teams in boys and girls basketball as well as cheerleading this winter.



The seventh grade boys basketball team was coached by Mr. Todd Gonser, LMS principal. They ended their season with a 5-7 record. The team had a lot of work to do as they came into the new season, but every player made big improvements in his skills. The boys also came together as a team and improved in every game, working to play better in the second half of the season against the top teams. Each player has been given something to work on for next year. Coach Gonser said, "With hard work and dedication, I look forward to many good things happening for this group. Nice work guys!"

This year's eighth grade boys basketball team, coached by Toby Teague, ended the season with a 6 - 6 record. The .500 record does not tell the entire story, however. Three of the losses were by a combined 13 points. Two of the losses were to a very tough Olivet team who went undefeated. One highlight of the season was the team's home court win against Stockbridge. The team worked hard to play tough man-to-man defense all season and took their first step toward their varsity careers, which the players look forward to in a few years. Coach Teague commented that "This team learned how to be TOUGH on the court and in practice. I was very proud of them and look for great things out of this group in the next four seasons."

The seventh grade girls basketball team was coached by LMS teacher Andrea Smolinski. The team had a season filled with several unexpected obstacles including several snow days, missed practices and games, and a flooded gym. Through it all, however, the girls never gave up and continued to grow both as a team and as individual players. They finished the season with a record of 5-3. Coach Smolinski said, "The girls were enjoyable to coach, and I look forward to their continued success."







Our eighth grade girls team, also coached by Toby Teague, had a record of 3-5. With only eight girls for most of the season and only seven players for the last two weeks of the season, they worked hard to get better each day. They learned what it means to be TOUGH and played a couple of games with only six players. With everything they faced, these girls showed improvement in their last game, winning by 20 points against a team they lost to twice last year. Coach Teague said, "They are becoming true basketball players. I was proud of their effort and improvement. I can't wait to see how they do in high school."

The MS competitive cheer team was coached by Kelsie Fifield. They had an outstanding season this year, taking home a GLAC league championship! The team made many small victories including new stunting, individual tumbling, and improvements in scoring across the board. The team this year had nine returning athletes and four new seventh grade girls. Each cheerleader had something to bring to the mat at each and every competition.

Other than competing with the league schools, the team also participated in two larger meets, one at Northwest and an invitational in Leslie. These meets proved to be great experiences for the girls because they had the opportunity to see schools they don't normally get to compete against. The girls had an all-time high score of 318 between both rounds. This was ten points higher than their highest score last year. The girls will be receiving individual honors soon. The JV girls basketball team, coached by new coach Trevor Rutan, also had an outstanding season, finishing their season 17-3. We look forward to another outstanding girls basketball season next year.



Third-year coach Tucker Surbrook continued to move our wrestling program forward, as they won their second consecutive team district title, defeating Michigan Center in the final match. As for the league, the Hawks were a solid second, only falling behind perennial power Lakewood. Three Hawks found their way to Ford Field for the individual state meet. Senior Logan Zebarah placed sixth. Junior Ethan Fehrenbach and sophomore Ben Smieska both came within one win of placing as well. Smieska also won the 189 lb. division at regionals. The wrestling team was also very successful at the GLAC league tournament. Three young men, sophomores Lucas Mooney, Gabe Weber, and Grant Weber, were all league champions and first team all-GLAC. Senior Joe Corts, juniors Kyle Weinstein, Nathaniel Courtney, and Fehrenbach, as well as Smieska were all second team GLAC. Junior Nick Siegert, sophomore Cannon Risner, and freshman Hunter Doyle were all-GLAC honorable mentions. The team was also chosen as an academic all-state selection for the second straight year. The girls competitive cheer team had another fine season under veteran coach Jean Maiville. The girls finished second in the GLAC again this year and continually improved throughout the season. Garnering first team GLAC honors were senior Graci Dack and juniors Jane Holcomb and Taylor McMahan. Christina Ghere was selected to the second team and junior Savanna Baughan was chosen honorable mention. The girls also earned honorable mention all-state academic honors for the second straight year. Additionally, our JV competitive cheer team, led by coach Katie Wixson, was successful this season, finishing a close second place in the league standings.

The young varsity boys basketball team, coached by Matt Johns, had a rollercoaster of a season. The team finished 10-10 overall, but 8-4 in the GLAC, which was good enough for a third place finish this winter. mention. Chris Bondsteel's JV boys also experienced an up-and-down season, finishing at 9-10. Our freshmen boys, led by Ryan Masters, fought hard but struggled through a 2-13 season.

Coach Brett Hills' bowling team had a rebuilding year this winter, having had seasons of tremendous success the previous few years. The boys finished 1-7 in the GLAC but were able to land senior Dwight Durfee and junior Lucas Carlson on the first team all-conference team. Senior Garret McGuirt and sophomore Alex Hultberg were chosen honorable mention. Durfee also qualified for the individual state meet in Muskegon, finishing 54th overall. The girls team struggled to a 2-4 league mark, but with many bowlers returning next season, things look bright. Junior Kayla Matthews earned her way onto the GLAC first team all-conference team and also qualified for the state meet, finishing a very respectable 20th place. Sophomores Haley Ellis and Katrina Walter and freshman Alexia Hughes earned second team honors. Sophomore Mariah Clark also made the honorable mention team.
