

New Blackhawk Head Coaches Highlight Fall Athletic Season



A new school year finds many changes to the Blackhawk coaching staff this year. The Leslie football program will be led by Coach Tom Johns who is also the high school's new math teacher. He brings eight years of experience to the Blackhawk sidelines this fall. Coach Johns grew up in Napoleon, played football and graduated from Defiance College in Ohio, earned his teaching certificate from Siena Heights University, and received a master's degree from Marygrove College. He is married, has three children, lives in Jackson, and comes to us from Jackson High where he has been the past three years. While at Jackson, he was an assistant coach to Scott Farley and for the past two years he served as the defensive coordinator for the Vikings. He taught math for one year at Jackson High and two years at Parkside Middle School. Before coaching at Jackson, he also coached and taught at Reading High School for three years and

coached at Napoleon for two years. Coach Johns will also have two new assistants joining him on the Blackhawk football staff: Todd Anderson, a 27-year veteran coach at Napoleon and Bob Eadier, who has coached five years previously at Michigan Center and Vandercook Lake. They will join Coach Johns this fall while assistants Tucker Surbrook, T.J. McCann, and Payne Blanchard return from last year's staff. The boys football team begins practice on Monday, August 7 and opens the season on August 24 at home versus Dansville.



Danielle Gibbs is returning to the Blackhawk volleyball staff, this time as the head coach. She was the JV coach four years ago before stepping down to have her third child. We are excited to have her back this year! Danielle, an eight-year veteran teacher at Woodworth Elementary, played volleyball and graduated from Saginaw Valley University. Over the past 10 years, she has also coached multiple AAU teams in addition to coaching at Leslie. She is married with three kids, and she and JV head coach Missy Smieska are very excited to continue to move Blackhawk volleyball forward. The girls begin practice on Wednesday, August 9 and open the season at the Olivet Invitational on August 26.



The boys soccer program will have Mike Compton as their new coach this fall. Coach Compton, who is returning for his second year of teaching English at the high school, played soccer and graduated from Owosso High School. He then graduated from Western Michigan University and has played on many travel and club teams. He has coached indoor soccer and middle school track. Additionally, he was a volunteer assistant coach for our girls varsity team last spring. He will be helped by Jake Alvarado, the previous head coach, who had to step down due to work conflicts. Mike is extremely enthusiastic and excited about the opportunity to

be the coach of the boys soccer team. They begin practice on Wednesday, August 9, and they play their first game on Friday, August 18 at home against Quincy.



Finally, our boys varsity tennis co-op team with Lansing Christian has a new coach this year. His name is Ashish Gollapalli. Ashish was a four-year player at East Lansing High School, graduated from MSU with an electrical engineering degree, and has helped coach tennis at both East Lansing as well as Lansing Catholic. He is married with two children. Coach Gollapalli will be helped out by Dan Langeland, our girls varsity tennis coach. The boys will begin practice on Wednesday, August 9 at Kiwanis Park in Holt and will open their regular season on Monday, August 21 at Kiwanis Park against Battle Creek Pennfield.

My favorite things about working for LPS is the commute, the people, and the fact that I worked here while my kids were in school, so I was able to be involved with them here. My most memorable moment during my time here would have to be the day the bus "escaped" from it's parking spot, slid (sans driver) along the length of the bus garage, and stopped when it hit a boom truck being used for the high school construction.

Pesticide/Herbicide Use Notification

Leslie Public Schools has adopted an Integrated Pest Management (IPM) program. Inherent with this are the District's efforts to reduce pesticide use as much as possible. While it may occasionally be necessary to apply a pesticide, these will only be used as a last resort. This program does not rely on routine pesticide applications to resolve problems. We use various techniques such as habitat alteration, sanitation, mechanical means, exclusion, etc. to prevent pests from becoming a problem.

Parents will receive advanced notice of the

application at their child's school of any pesticide other than a bait or gel formulation. This advance notice of the application will be given 48 hours before the application. The law requires us to provide notification by using two methods. The second method we are going to use is posting a notice in a common area located by the main office of the school. Parents are also entitled to receive this notice by first-class United States mail postmarked at least three days before the application. If you would like to be notified by mail, please contact the Facility Department at 517-589-8413. Leave your name, mailing address and which school your child attends.

In an emergency (for example, bees nest), pesticides may be applied without prior notice, but parents will be provided notice following any such application.

You may review our IPM program or pesticide application records by calling the Facility Director at 517-589-8413 or by emailing troy.james@lesliek12.net. This number or email may also be used when school is not in regular session.

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



Rights, Protection and Benefits for Homeless Children

Your children may be eligible for certain rights and protections under the Federal McKinney-Vento Act. Homeless children and youth are defined as individuals who lack a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence. Does your family live in a homeless shelter, motel, campground, car, abandoned building or doubled up with other people due to loss of housing? If so, your children may have the right to homeless benefits. If you believe your children may be eligible for these benefits, contact the homeless liaison (Marcy Best 517-589-8200 ext. 101) or a school counselor for more information.

The Leslie Outreach, a food bank, can provide low income families living in Leslie Public School District with one week's worth of groceries per month.
